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Company Background



- Incorporated in California in 1905
 - One of the largest combined natural gas and electric utilities in the United States
 - Serves approximately 15 million people throughout a 70,000-square-mile service area
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- ~ 6,600 miles gas transmission pipeline
 - ~ 42,000 miles of gas distribution main
 - 4.5 million natural gas customer accounts
 - Deliver 970 BCF/year
